

GJMT Manuscript Submission Check List

1	Title page	Manuscript title, full names of author(s), affiliations of author(s), institutional address, functional email address of each author, the corresponding author name, affiliation and email address.
2	Abstract	Should be submitted in a separate page. Should not be more than 350 words. A concise, informative, briefly presenting the topic, indicating significant data and point out major findings and conclusions is required. Abbreviations and references should be avoided.
3	Keywords	Six appropriate keywords to be written after the abstract.
4	Introduction	The introduction should provide sufficient background information for readers to understand the research to be described. The introduction must include in text citations including references to pertinent primary scientific literature. The specific aims of the research along with its rationale should be identified at the end of the introduction.
5	Materials and methods	It should be complete enough. Previously published procedures should be cited. New procedures should be described in details.
6	Results	Results and their significance should be presented clearly and concisely, preferably in the form of graphs and tables which should be self explanatory.
7	Discussion	It should contain a critical review of the results in the light of the previously published relevant literatures.
8	Conclusion	This should state clearly the main conclusions of the research with clear explanation of their importance and relevance in addition to recommendations.
9	Conflict of interest	All financial, commercial or other relationships that might be perceived by the academic community as representing a potential conflict of interest must be disclosed. If no such relationship exists, authors will be asked to confirm the following statement: The authors declare that the research was conducted without any commercial or financial relationships that can be of any potential conflict of interest.
10	Author contributions	The Author Contributions statement must describe the contributions of individual authors referred to by their initials and, in doing so, all authors agree to be accountable for the content of the work.
11	Funding	If external funding has been obtained for the study, then it should be mentioned in a separate section.
12	Acknowledgment	It should be placed in a separate section after conclusion.

14	Tables	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Tables should be uploaded in an editable format (word doc or excel file, no images files or pdf files). ▪ Tables should be self-explanatory and should not duplicate textual material. ▪ Number tables using Arabic numerals consecutively in the order of their first citation in the text and supply a brief title for each. ▪ Place explanatory matter in footnotes, not in the heading. ▪ Explain in footnotes all non-standard abbreviations that are used in each table. ▪ Obtain permission for all fully borrowed, adapted, and modified tables and provide a credit line in the footnote. ▪ For footnotes use superscript numbers, letters, or symbols (*, †, ‡, §, , ¶, **, ††, ‡‡) ▪ Tables with their legends should be placed at the end of the text after the references. The tables along with their number should be cited at the relevant place in the text.
15	Figures	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Upload the images in jpeg, png, tiff, or gif format (not pdf) exactly how they should appear in the printed article. Figures are not edited by the production staff. ▪ Figures should be numbered consecutively according to the order in which they

		<p>have been first cited in the text.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ Labels, numbers, and symbols should be clear and of uniform size (11 or 12 point font).▪ Dimensions of the figure should be at least 5 inches wide.▪ Resolution should be at least 300 dpi.▪ Symbols, arrows, or letters used in photomicrographs should contrast with the background and should be marked neatly with transfer type or by tissue overlay and not by pen.▪ Titles and detailed explanations belong in the legends for illustrations not on the illustrations themselves.▪ When graphs, scatter-grams or histograms are submitted the numerical data on which they are based should also be supplied.▪ The photographs and figures should be trimmed to remove all the unwanted areas.▪ If photographs of individuals are used, their pictures must be accompanied by written permission to use the photograph.▪ If a figure has been published elsewhere, acknowledge the original source and submit written permission from the copyright holder to reproduce the material. A credit line should appear in the legend for such figures.▪ Legends for illustrations: Type or print out legends (maximum 40 words, excluding the credit line) for illustrations using double spacing, with Arabic numerals corresponding to the illustrations. When symbols, arrows, numbers, or letters are used to identify parts of the illustrations, identify and explain each one in the legend. Explain the internal scale (magnification) and identify the method of staining in photomicrographs.▪ The Journal reserves the right to crop, rotate, reduce, or enlarge the photographs to an acceptable size.	
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
